

VDH Updates: Testing

Testing capacity:

- ~267 sites (261 CIC on-demand; 6 pop-ups) posted 1/18/21 1/31/21
 - Same-day testing slots now posted all day; 28,068 slots currently open.
- NOTE: VDH posted testing sites are intended for asymptomatic pts.; prefer symptomatic pts. to seek connection to PCP/medical home.
- CIC locations include:
 - Bennington, Berlin, Brattleboro Mem. Hosp, Burlington, Fairlee, Hardwick, Island Pond, Middlebury, Morrisville, N. Country Hosp, Northfield, Springfield, RRMC, St. J, Stratton, Waitsfield, Waterbury, Williamstown, Williston, Winooski
 - Days of the week/hours vary by site
- Pop-up locations listed: Burlington, Colchester, St. Albans, Williston





VDH Update: Testing (cont'd.)

VDH preferred protocol for obtaining COVID-19 results for patients tested at CIC on-demand or VDH pop-up sites:


- Providers should first check VITL for any testing completed through Dr. Levine's orders – this will be the most expedient and immediate way to access results. If they do not have access to VITL, and cannot gain access to VITL, then the provider may contact:
 - <u>ahs.vdhhoccovidresultsletters@vermont.gov</u> provide the name & DOB of their patient and the request for their results in order to help treat that patient.
- Many thanks to those who responded to our brief survey (1/15/21) which confirmed that many Vermont PCPs do not have access nor regularly use VITL, which adds a layer of complexity and administrative burden to office systems already stretched thin in the current context.










(NATIONAL) AAP APPROACH TO EQUITY

TRT BYLAWS REFERENDUM

RESOLUTION FOR AMENDMENT TO THE BYLAWS OF THE AMERICAN ACADEMY OF PEDIATRICS

RESOLVED, that the Bylaws of the American Academy of Pediatrics shall be hereby amended to include a first new article pertaining to anti-discrimination. The article in its entirety is as follows:

ARTICLE I

Anti-Discrimination: Embracing equity for all children and families as well as for the pediatricians who care for them is central to the mission of the Academy. The AAP is committed to achieving meaningful diversity and inclusion and to combat bias and discrimination in all its forms, including structural and systemic racism.

AAP does not discriminate on the basis of race, ethnicity, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, and national origin.





WORKING GROUP #1: CLINICAL PRACTICE

Audience: pediatricians and other health care providers who care for children

Possible deliverables would include specific guidance for:

- addressing race as part of anticipatory guidance
- assessing patients for stressors associated with racism to connect families to resources
- assessing patients who report experiencing racism for mental health conditions ...to make referrals to mental health services
- identify strengths and assess for protective factors
- identify clinical resources to improve care of patients with black and brown skin

WORKING GROUP #2: CLINICAL ENVIRONMENT/CULTURE

Audience: pediatric and family medicine clinics, hospitals, residential facilities

Possible deliverables:

- glossary of terms/concepts for healthcare providers
- resources for providers for further self-directed learning (e.g. scaffolded anti-racism resources)
- Train clinical and office staff in culturally competent care according to national standards for culturally and linguistically appropriate services
- Tailored guidance on creating more inclusive space visits to practices
- lots of input from family advisors and youth needed here
- Photovoice project community-based participatory research to document and reflect reality

- Resources for BIPOC patients and families with focus on local supports (community partners)
