



He was instrumental in the redesign of the Orthopaedic Trauma Service, which cultivated a higher capacity to care for trauma patients, and created more opportunities for residents. His students have twice elected him Teacher of the Year. Dr. Bartlett has produced more than 50 publications, given nearly 20 presentations at national and international meetings, serves as a faculty member for over 90 regional and national courses, and has overseen three funded research projects.
