# Higgins to speak on Nicotine Reduction Symposium at 2018 SRNT Conference

VCBH Director, Stephen Higgins, Ph.D., will join the nation's leading tobacco researchers at the 2018 Society for Research on Nicotine and Tobacco (SRNT)

Conference, to discuss supporting evidence of the proposed reduced nicotine policy to decrease smoking rates. The panel will also look to identify important research gaps and issues raised by this policy. Dr. Higgins will describe his most recent epidemiological and human laboratory studies on the impact of reduced nicotine



content cigarettes in vulnerable populations. Other presenters include: Dorothy Hatsukami, Ph.D., (University of Minnesota), Saul Shiffman, Ph.D., (University of Pittsburgh), & Eric Donny, Ph.D., (Wake Forest University).

critical importance to improving U.S. population health. Dr. Stephen Higgins, Guest Editor and Director of the Vermont Center on Behavior and Health, explains that,

VCBH faculty member, Stacey Sigmon, Ph.D., received a \$3.7 million grant from the National Institute of Drug Abuse to continue the development and evaluation of a novel Interim Buprenorphine Treatment (IBT), that leverages pharmacotherapy, state-of-the-art technology, and rigorous methodology to bridge existing wait list delays in treatment access. Sigmon states, "In an initial R32 randomized pilot study, we demonstrated reductions in illicit opioid use and risk behaviors among wait listed opioid abusers receiving IBT. This project will seek to replicate those highly promising results while simultaneously evaluating generality of our findings to additional rural settings outside of University of Vermont."

Cecilia Begeria is in her 5th and final year in the Experimental Psychology program as a Tobacco Center on Regulatory Science predoctoral trainee. Her research focuses on substance use and how it impacts women's health during their reproductive years. She is very proud of her Master's thesis, "Comparing Smoking Topography and Subjective Measures of Usual Brand Cigarettes Between Pregnant and Non-pregnant Smokers", which was recently published in Nicotine & Tobacco Research.

Danielle Davis is a 4th year student in the Experimental Psychology program with a concentration in Human Behavioral Pharmacology. Her research focuses on the effects of reduced nicotine content cigarettes and she specifically is interested in the moderating effect of mentholation. She is also interested in contingency management interventions and is currently conducting a pilot study investigating the impact of a contingency management intervention for smoking cessation in pregnant women on infant eating behavior postpartum. Recently, Danielle presented the results of her Master's Project examining the moderating effect of menthol content in reduced nicotine content cigarettes at the 2017 College of Problems on Drug Dependence Annual Meeting.

Joanna Streck is a 4th year student in the Clinical Psychology program. Her research focuses on the effects of reduced-nicotine content cigarettes in vulnerable populations, with a focus on those with concurrent opioid use disorder. She is also interested in intersections between opioid use disorder, tobacco use disorder, and psychopathology. Recently, Joanna presented the results of a randomized clinical trial examining the effects of reduced-nicotine content cigarettes on vulnerable populations at the TCORS Grantee meeting at the NIH.
